




FLUCTUATION IN STOMEX SHARES

STOMEX COMMUNICATIONS WAS IN DIFFICULTY for the second time this year following its delivery of a second profit warning to shareholders. Selling by investment houses saw shares fall sharply to 80p, their lowest level for six years. This is in marked contrast to just eighteen months ago, they more than doubled, following the announcement of Stomex's new wide-band phone. CEO Günther Meier blamed the saturation of the mobile


phone market for the firm's declining fortunes. remained confident, however, that Stomex's competitive edge would allow it to return to profitability once excess capacity had been taken out of the market, and the public saw the advantages of the new technology. Shares rose slightly to 90p at the end of trading. Meier's position is, however, less certain as he meets troubled board members at a hastilyscheduled meeting next week.

SHARKS GATHER AT STOMEX

Stomex Communications is heading towards the rocks again after announcing its second profit's S.O.S. this year. Panic selling saw the shares slump to 80p, their lowest price for six years, as city investment firms abandoned ship. It's hard to believe that just eighteen months ago, Stomex was riding the crest of a wave with shares soaring to £6.80 following the news of the Navigator wide-band

phone. CEO Günther Meier points the finger at the over-capacity in the market but remains confident that Stomex will weather the storm. He maintains that as soon as the public sees the potential of the new technology, the firm will be back on course. Shares went up slightly, but there is trouble ahead for captain Meier as the sharks gather for next week's emergency board meeting.
